Introduction

Additional Project for Lesson 35

Research a primary document, such as a firsthand account of one of the dictators listed in project a) for this lesson or a newspaper article written during the time period of World War II, and analyze how the document is structured in regards to how key sentences, paragraphs, and other portions of the text contribute to the whole piece. A primary text is very different than other forms of research and scholarly writing, and thus the craft a writer uses in writing a primary next needs to be understood and easily recognized. Be sure you focus on the craft of the writing in your analysis, not the information being presented or the meaning of the document.
